After I graduated from the University of Texas at Austin, some 51+ years ago, I have been engaged in engineering of some variety. It was fun in the beginning and it is still fun. My definition of fun is that you get up each morning looking forward to the challenges the day will bring in your job.

My first employer was Texas Electric Service Company and I worked three very different positions. In 1969, I joined Cowan, Love and Jackson, Inc. (whose corporate name is now Friberg Associates Inc.) At that time the cities of Dallas and Fort Worth had agreed to build a joint airport. Cowan, Love and Jackson had a joint-venture with a Dallas engineer to do the basic design for all four of the terminals. One of the joys

Many types of buildings give you an opportunity to practice "service above self".

Recently Friberg Associates has

been selected as the master systems engineer for a project at DFW airport to renovate the four original terminal buildings. It is truly fun to examine all the systems that you helped select and design forty years ago and decide what upgrades and replacements are necessary to provide a serviceable building for the next forty years. This is a wonderful opportunity to serve future generations of North Texans.

If you have a child or grandchild that has an interest in science and mathematics, good common sense and the ability to get along with people, suggest that they at least investigate the field of engineering as their chosen career path. They will have a wonderful opportunity to enjoy their work.

The program on February 19 introduced the membership to a new, comprehensive healthcare center for breast cancer. Joan Katz, a three-time survivor of the disease detailed her journey, expressing appreciation for comprehensive services located in other cities. She shared facts about breast cancer—it affects 1 in 8 persons today (mostly women but some men), it is the number one reason for death among women ages 24 to 54 and every three minutes, someone is diagnosed. Her dream for a local center came from phone calls from newly diagnosed women who asked where to go—she had to tell them the needed services were scattered around the community. The new Andrews Women’s Hospital at Baylor All Saints wanted to focus on centers of excellence, including oncology. They asked Joan if they could attach her name to the new breast center. She agreed. The Joan Katz Breast Center at Baylor All Saints will be

completed in April 2010.

The next speaker Steven Newton, President of Baylor All Saints Medical Centers, noted that this was a project of listening and responding to medical experts and to patients. To make the dream a reality, the new center must have personalized care, coordinated services, qualified leadership, state-of-the art technologies, and clinical research. The focus is the patient and family, providing medical and emotional support. The new center is unique—providing all services free, including a patient navigator to educate the patient and coordinate treatment. Services include emotional counseling, a social worker, genetic testing, rehabilitation and wellness. It is also collaboration with other hospitals. During construction, over 800 patients have been served. The Joan Katz Breast Center at Baylor All Saints provides the Fort Worth community with a comprehensive center to serve persons with breast cancer and their families.

Pat Hawkins gave the invocation, *Harriett Harral* led the National Anthem, *Wade Wallace* introduced guests, *Mike Guyton* delivered the newscast, *Sid Johnston* recognized years of service, *Susan Morgan* spoke about the STARS program, *Kathryn Thompson* introduced new members, and *Richard Minker* introduced the speakers.

Friday's Speaker



Dr. W. Marvin Dulaney

Dr. W. Marvin Dulaney is Associate Professor of History at the University of Texas, Arlington. He teaches American History, African-American History, Public History, and the History of the American Civil Rights Movement in UTA's undergraduate and graduate History programs. He was born in Troy, Alabama, but grew up and attended elementary and secondary schools in Alliance, Ohio. He is a graduate of Central State University in Wilberforce, Ohio, where he earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in History, magna cum laude. He earned his Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees in American and African-American history at Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio.

From 1994 to 2008, he taught at the College of Charleston, South Carolina and served as the Executive Director of the Avery Research Center for African-American History and Culture. He also served as Chair of the History Department from 1998 to 2004, and as Director of the African

American Studies Program from 1994 to 2007.

He has taught previously at the University of Texas at Arlington (1958-1994), and Ohio State University and St. Olaf College in Minnesota. He has also worked at Wittenberg University, Central State University and Texas Christian University in counseling, student services and with Upward Bound program.

While teaching at UTA, Dr. Dulaney also served as the Curator of History with the Dallas Museum of African-American Life and Culture. He taught the Museum's history courses, coordinated the Museum's annual History Fair, and chaired the Museum's annual "African-American History in Texas" conference. He also worked with the Dallas Independent School District's African-American Cultural Heritage Center as a consultant, and he moderated the annual African-American Heritage Bowl for middle and high school students from 1987-1993. He also developed and taught the Museum's annual Summer History Camps. He was the author and presenter of "African-American History Notes" on KKDA Soul 73 AM radio station in Dallas.

His first book, Black Police in America, was published by Indiana University Press in January 1996. Currently, he is completing a social and political history of African-Americans in Dallas, Texas for Texas A&M University Press.

Most recently, in 2009 the UTA NAACP Student Chapter awarded him its "Distinguished Faculty Award" and in 2008 the College of Charleston's Multicultural Student Programs Office awarded him the "Alexander M. Sanders Presidential Legacy Award for Outstanding Public Service." In 2001 Central State University's College of Liberal Arts presented him its "Distinguished Alumni Award."

He is a member of the Organization of American Historians, the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History, the Texas State Historical Association, and former president of the Southern Conference on Afro-American Studies (1994-1995).
